# Climate Smart Communities Profile

March 2014



The Climate Smart Communities (CSC) program is a New York State initiative to help local communities reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, prepare for effects of climate change and save taxpayers money. The program is designed to address 10 focus areas, or "pledge elements," outlined in the CSC Pledge: <a href="http://www.dec.ny.gov/energy/53013.html">http://www.dec.ny.gov/energy/53013.html</a>.

Action	Status	Description
Adopted CSC Pledge	Completed	The City adopted the pledge in 2013.

# **Pledge Element 3: Decrease Energy Demand for Local Government Operations**

Action	Status	Description
Upgraded wastewater treatment facilities	Completed	An energy efficiency study of the Waste Water Treatment Plant was completed and implementation of newer, energy efficient equipment was initiated in 2011 and completed in 2012. The Water Treatment Plant has been undergoing an upgrade to the sludge collection equipment.
Energy Audit conducted	Completed	Siemens conducted an energy audit of City buildings about 6 years ago (prior to City Hall offices being relocated). Facilities were upgraded as a result of that audit.
Fleet Efficiency Measures	Identified	The City is investigating the best way to increase fleet efficiency. Intervid is also being researched as an option to keep track of mileage driven.

# Pledge Element 5: Realize Benefits of Recycling and Other Climate Smart Solid Waste Management Practices

Action	Status	Description
Construction material recycling program	Identified	The Troy Local Development Corporation is working with Hudson River Natural Products Recycling to coordinate taking the City's discarded construction materials for recycling.
Curbside Compost Program	Identified	Troy partnered with Watervliet and Schenectady on a CFA application to start a composting program. The City has the funding and space to jumpstart this program within City limits. They are approaching this program as a way to reduce tipping fees, which are nearing \$1.2 million a year.
Hazardous Waste Disposal Events	Completed	The City hosts annual hazardous waste disposal events on Earth Day.
Single Stream Recycling Program	Completed	The City adopted single stream recycling in October 2010.

# **Pledge Element 6: Promote Climate Protection Through Community Land Use Tools**

Action	Status	Description
Adopted a Comprehensive Plan for the Community	In progress	The City of Troy received a grant in 2013 to update their comprehensive plan. The City is interested in incorporating sustainability principles into the plan.
Street Tree Committee	Completed	Troy has a Street Tree Committee that works in partnership with the Capital District Community Gardens.
Complete Streets Policy	Completed	The City worked with Transport Troy to adopt a Complete Streets Policy in 2012.

# **Pledge Element 7: Plan for Adaptation to Unavoidable Climate Change**

Action	Status	Description
Property Acquisition in Flood Prone Areas	Completed	The City received funding from FEMA to purchase properties that are flood prone areas.
Riverfront Park Design	Completed	The newly designed and constructed Riverfront Park was designed to deflect flood waters from the Hudson River.

# **Pledge Element 8: Support a Green Innovation Economy**

Action	Status	Description
Troy Waterfront Farmers' Market	Completed	Troy Waterfront Farmers' Market is a non-profit organization that is made possible through a partnership with the City of Troy. Every Saturday, more than 70 vendors participate in the Farmers' Market along a closed down street in Troy.

# **Pledge Element 9: Inform and Inspire the Public**

Action	Status	Description
Earth Day Events	Completed	The City hosts an Earth Day Event every year, which includes a clean-up and distribution of yard waste bags, t-shirts, etc.
Annual Clean-Ups for Tomhannock Watershed	Completed	In May 2013, 40 volunteers joined Rensselaer Land Trust, Capital District Community Gardens' Produce Project and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for a stream and preserve cleanup at the John B. Staalesen Vanderheyden Preserve along the Wynants Kill.
Stormwater Pollution Awareness Campaign: Only Rain in the Drain	Identified	Auto Recyclers' Program for stormwater management is to prevent oil, grease, antifreeze and other material from mixing with rainwater in storm drains.

Action	Status	Description
Protect Tomhannock Watershed	Identified	The Rensselaer Land Trust is interested in helping protect the Tomhannock Watershed.
